Dear Parish Family -

As I write this, we are approaching the Feast of Pentecost, that awesome day on which Scripture tells us the Holy Spirit of God descended upon the heads of Jesus' apostles, transforming them from a tiny group of 11 confused, grieving and frightened men into a powerful force which "turned the known world upside-down" and established what would soon become the Christian Church. The message of the Gospel of Salvation in Jesus Christ which they carried to people all over the known world – from the Near East to Europe – spread like wildfire. Many died a martyr's death to make sure the message of God's love – the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and everlasting life - continued to be proclaimed. While that message continues today, and continues to draw thousands to Christ in developing nations, the lure of Christianity seems to gleam a bit less brightly in established, more complacent countries like our own. Yet there are still many, many people in civilized nations who need to hear that the Good News that the God whom we worship is a God of love, not wrath, and that the promise of redemption and life beyond the grave is for them, as well. By our Baptism, we have been commissioned by Christ to extend that message wherever we are, and wherever we go. Those promises we make at Baptism – to attend church faithfully and participate in the worshiping community; to persevere in resisting evil; to seek and serve Christ in all persons; to strive for justice and peace and to respect the dignity of every human being, are the ways in which, by the grace of God, we proclaim that message by word and example. Let this mind be in all of us this summer, whether we travel on vacation or remain at home near our families and friends. The Holy Spirit offers us opportunities every day to witness to the love of God in our lives by extending mercy and forgiveness, hospitality, compassion and generosity – at home, at work, at school and even on vacation! Let us be open to opportunities, to the guiding of the Spirit, and be strengthened in our mission by the knowledge that the Spirit is in us as much as it ever was in Jesus or in his earliest apostles, since we are the risen and living Body of Christ in the world today.
